Attendees will be given a survey of the national anti-regulatory sentiments, national active supervision, and curative measures responsive to the Federal Trade Commission v. North Carolina Dental Board Supreme Court Decision. Attendees will also review best practices for licensing boards in the handling of: meetings, rulemaking, complaints, investigations, hearings and settlements, and communications with applicants and licensees. A discussion will also be held on interstate compacts and how to better manage scope of practice conflicts with informal procedures, memorandum of understanding, and potential judicial alternatives. These lessons will enable attendees to gain an understanding of best practices to avoid antitrust liability in the occupational licensure setting.

the various NCIC compact projects. He has been a primary drafter of many compacts including multistate licensure compacts for the professions of nursing, medicine, physical therapy, emergency medical services and psychology.
